#### Vetiver : To Find Me Gone

In a marginally more direct manner than its whispery progenitor, "To Find Me Gone" surpasses the eponymous debut from Andy Cabic's ever-evolving Bay Area band, confirming Vetiver as the unlikely standard bearers for the resurgent Californian scene in the process. Cabic has pulled together a throng of likeminded musicians (which already included Devendra Banhart and Espers drummer Otto Hauser) to augment the Vetiver sound and it has worked a treat, creating a dreamy mix of alternative country psyche that pulses, floats and gallops its way down from the West Coast hippie HQ.

#### Midlake : The Trials Of Van Occupanther

Midlake's second album propels them from their American indie roots into a whole new world of radio-friendly sounds, unashamedly reverential to the AOR foundations laid in the late 70s by Fleetwood Mac. Regrouping for their sophomore effort, the Texan band and set about changing their direction from the bottom-up, probably listening en masse to The Eagles and CSN&Y before coming up with the homogeneous set of songs about yearning, marriage and made-up history. If the opening track "Roscoe" doesn't convince you, then we'd advise you to check your pulse, but they won't remain under-the-radar for long.

#### **Cat Power : The Greatest**

Chan Marshall, the wayward daughter of US alt-rock knuckles down, loosens up, ropes in 'proper' musicians and makes her possibly her 'greatest' album to date. It seems the engine room of the 70s Memphis Hi Sound (Al Green, Ann Peebles, O.V. Wright) have demanded tighter song structures to flesh out with their effortless sense of groove, borne of deep Southern soul, country and blues. Similarly, the songs themselves become less opaque, the tales of lost love, drunken nights and empty days more immediate and powerful. Only time will tell whether it will stand up to "Dusty In Memphis" or "Lady Soul" in the future.

Nicole Willis And The Soul Investigators : Keep Reachin' Up Soul With a sound reminiscent of a 1960s Motown floor-stomper, Brooklyn-born soulstress Nicole Willis and the New Orlean-ized Helsinki funk outfit The Soul Investigators first came to everyone's attention back in mid-2005 with the release of their debut single "If This Ain't Love (Don't Know What Is)" (one of Gilles Peterson's tracks of that year). 2006 brought us a whole long-player of bona fide retro-sounding, floor-shakin' soul and down-to-the-bone funk goodness which really hits the spot. As Willis says, their sound reminds her of dancing with her sister to new James Brown tracks in their local record shop when they were children.





#### CSS : Cansei De Ser Sexy

#### Punk Funk

Hailing from São Paulo, one of the world's hottest cities (in both temperature and abundance of beautiful people), CSS's debut album "Cansei de Ser Sexy" (Portuguese for "Tired of Being Sexy") is a total assault on the senses. After every turn is another track filled with things that make you go 'mmmm', where sexcrazed lyrics ride over crunchy guitar riffs and hip-shaking beats. A revelation live (gig of the year for the lucky Piccadilly Records staff who blagged their way in), sounding like The Slits seen through the kaleidoscopic eyes of The DFA.

#### Tapes 'n Tapes : The Loon

Hailing from Minneapolis, Tapes 'n Tapes caused a seismic stir in the knowing, underground circles by releasing one of the finest indie guitar albums of this or any other year. On their debut "The Loon" Tapes 'n Tapes have produced a wayward lo-fi masterpiece, delivering anthemic hooks and explosive melodic highs in a style that mixes the angular looseness of early Pavement, the brooding wails of the Pixies and the 'now sounds' of Wolf Parade. Signed to XL, after a triumphant SXSW and the ensuing A&R scrum, they're already being hailed as the new kings of indie guitar rock.

#### New Psyche Folk

With a sound too inclusive to be simply labelled 'folk' Philadelphia's Espers have created their second album of eerie shimmering psychedelia, layered with familiar sounds and haunting, medieval harmonies. Introduced by subtle rattling chimes and electronic tones the pace remains sombre throughout, where gently picked, lilting melodies retain their sinister content. Using a myriad of instruments, the effortless ebb and flow is simultaneously archaic and timeless. Be prepared to be both calmed and disturbed as sheer melancholic beauty washes over ominous drones until the final drifting textures fade.

#### Calexico : Garden Ruin

#### M. Ward : Post-War

An idealised period soundtrack to any conflict-free time rather that a comment on the 'war on terror' per se, "Post-War" sticks to hopeful themes with an ever changing palette of Telecasters, keyboards and ballads. Including appearances by Neko Case and My Morning Jacket's Jim James, the raucous "Right In The Head" switches to the tender title track with no loss in momentum. Whether it's that timeserved voice that imparts gravitas and wisdom or the guitar playing seemingly picked up on the Appalachian trail and Delta blues circuits, there's a maturity here that's way beyond Matt Ward's thirty-odd years.

#### Indie / Americana

If you were expecting another Tex-Mex recipe of Mariachi rock, then the fifth album from the Tucson, Arizona group may appear like a new chapter in the continuing Calexico saga. Overall, it's still distinctly Calexico - atmospheric and intense with haunting strings and trumpet blasts, but they explore new frontiers with a much more song-based set. We readily admit that it's a grower which you need to devote some time to appreciate , with it's more country-rock sound and even a slightly poppier sensibility - epitomised by the sensational "Cruel", "Bisbee Blue" and "Letter To Bowie Knife".





#### S J Dilla : Donuts

Hip Hop

Not a conventional album by any means, Dilla's "Donuts" is a collection of numerous short productions that he kept to himself rather than use on his work with Madlib, Q-Tip, Common and Slum Village. Like a private DJ mixtape, they clock in on average at around nintey seconds, yet this is not merely a beats compilation, but mini sample-manipulations glommed from other funk, soul, disco, rap and rock sources. With awfully coincidental timing, Dilla passed away the week that the album was released, having been suffering from an incurable blood disorder. A fitting epitaph to a unique talent.

#### Pink Mountaintops : Axis Of Evol

Although unfairly overlooked in last year's chart. Black Mountain's debut album has gradually obtained a level of near-deification here at Piccadilly Records. With Jagjaguwar's stock being so high at present, mainly thanks to their impeccable roster, expectations were heaped onto Stephen McBean's shoulders for this sideproject. Not one to shirk from responsibility, he has responded spectacularly with a lo-fi trippy psychedelic space-rock opus, which is slowly growing in reverence and is in danger of eclipsing the stellar heights already scaled by his Black Mountain brethren.

Indie / Garage A rock'n'roll group for rock'n'roll fans that refuse to go unnoticed, produced by Liam Watson (The White Stripes, The Kills). They're demanding, sexy, manipulative and raw debut "Shake The Dust" is the coruscating mix of early punk and beat bands such as The Stooges, The Beatles and The Rolling Stones fused with the independent femininity of 60s melodic country acts like Patsy Cline and Nancy Sinatra. Songs like "Dead And Gone" make your speakers sound as if they've been slit with a razorblade, while "Reputation" is hard-hitting, spacey, garage rock.



#### Rekid : Made In Menorca

Matt Edwards is no stranger to these parts. As Radio Slave and half of Quiet Village he's responsible for a stream of cutting edge 12"s. It is here on Soul Jazz however under his more underground alias Rekid that he has really been able to shine. "Made in Menorca" reeks of Detroit and can be viewed as a respectful homage to the Motor City's recent musical history (Carl Craig, Theo Parrish, J Dilla et al). Here lies an album that grows stronger with every listen, all-pervasive electronic music that never once sounds cold or faceless.

#### The Beauty Room : The Beauty Room

The pet project of esteemed techno producer Kirk Degiorgio and singer Jinadu, The Beauty Room is a radical diversion from their usual output. Inspired by late 70s and 80s AOR rock, their one-off brand of blue-eved soul recalls John Martyn, 10CC. Steely Dan and other Balearic rock beards. Opening and closing with soaring acoustic soul ballads, their first album is an unashamedly lavish listening experience. Slick strings slide beneath enchanting harmonies in a warm analogue soup, featuring the sunny "Burn My Bridges", magisterial "The Weight Of The World" and cover Jan Hammer's "Don't You Know".





#### Lily Allen : Alright, Still

It's been a whirlwind year for Lily Allen. After signing a low-key deal with Regal late last year, no one could have predicted how quickly she'd make an impression on the nation. Following promo-only 45 "LDN" and the chart-topping "Smile", "Alright, Still" was a whole LP of puts-a-smile-on-your-face pop music, produced with Manc ex-drum'n'bassers Future Cut and Mark Ronson. Sweet reggae skankers like the singles and are mixed with 60s flavoured gems like "Everything's Just Wonderful" and "Shame For You". Add the "Puppet On A String"-meets-Bavarian-oompah-band "Alfie" and the record is just one long sing-a-long.




#### Lone Official : Tuckassee Take

#### Sol Seppy : The Bells Of 1 2

After criss-crossing America supporting Radiohead, cellist Sophie Michalitsianos returned home to Catskill, New York to begin single-handedly crafting her enchantingly dreamlike debut album. It's an exquisite, delicate blend of classically inspired, ethereal ambient folktronica from the nomadic Sparklehorse collaborator. "Bells Of 1 2" treads a fine line, managing at the same time to be both intimate and majestic. Sol Seppy's haunting vocals setting obligue and heartfelt metaphysical questions about the nature of love and its place as prime motivator of human relationships over a subtle, achingly beautiful backdrop.

Indie / Americana Nothing felt as if it would ever be the same again when Stephen Malkmus left Pavement and consigned one of the greatest bands of the 90s to history. But fear not, because Nashville's Lone Official have picked up the indie rock torch. Produced by Mark Nevers (veteran of Will Oldham, Silver Jews, Calexico, Lambchop and Candi Staton) Lone Official sing alternative rock songs with subtle Americana references (pedal steel, baseball, aviation, road trips) and more obtuse topics (like French sportswear on "Le Cog Sportif"), delivered by Matt Burton's part Tom Verlaine, part Kurt Wagner loguacious vocals.





#### Yeah Yeah Yeahs : Show Your Bones

As Kings of Leon proved in 2005, the best tactic after releasing a critically adored debut is to blow it clean out of the water with your follow-up. With this in mind, "Show Your Bones" will achieve classic album status. Taking the fractious blueprint set down on "Fever To Tell", Brooklyn's Yeah Yeah Yeahs have tempered their brittle art-punk metre with an (almost) funky swaggering funk (the LL Cool J borrowing "Phenomena"), grandiose soundscapes ("Gold Lion") and anthemic epics ("Turn Into You"). All this and there's still room for their trademark sound which got the hipsters so rapturous in the first place.

#### Howling Bells : Howling Bells

Howling Bells have got it all. They've got the style, they've got the swagger and most of all they've got the tunes. Their eponymous debut album is an intoxicating collection of killer tracks, lurching from addictive blues-fuelled rock to country-folk lamentations, all topped with the awesome sultry vocals of Juanita Stein. The band's many musical influences include the likes of Johnny Cash, Tom Waits, Kate Bush, Loretta Lynn, Mazzy Star and My Bloody Valentine, and you can hear little facets of them all in their sound.







#### Six Organs Of Admittance : The Sun Awakens

Following on from 2005's sublime "School Of The Flower" comes this dark newpsyche-folk creation from the mind of Ben Chasny. This time he has enlisted fellow Comets On Fire members amongst others and this has brought a harder, darkened edge to the mellow sound of his previous LP. "The Sun Awakens" is an awe-inspiring collection of mystical and celestial drones, stormy psyched-up guitar distortion and pastoral folk passages. The 24-minute otherworldly chant / drone epic "River Of Transfiguration" rounds-off the album with a mythical mantra slightly reminiscent of the Stooges' "We Will Fall".

PICALIA Various Artists : Tropicalia – A Brazilian Revolution In Sound As championed by the likes of David Byrne, Beck, The Bees, Kurt Cobain, Stereolab. Tortoise and many more.

Tropicalia revolutionized Brazilian music in the late 60s, mixing up psychedelic rock, avant-garde musique concrete, samba, funk and soul into a truly unique combination. Against the backdrop of the most violent and repressive days of Brazilian military dictatorship. the artists on this collection created a new style of music considered so radical that both Caetano Veloso and Gilberto Gil were seen as such a threat by the ruling junta that they were first imprisoned then finally deported. This album brings together all the artists involved in Tropicalia, including Os Mutantes, Gilberto Gil and Caetano Veloso.



#### Various Artists : Nuggets : Original Artyfacts From The 1st Psychedelic Fra

Originally released in 1972 this album was compiled by Elektra Records

founder Jac Holzman with assistance and input from guitarist and music historian Lenny Kaye. This deceptively haphazard 27-track aggregate became the cornerstone of the serious appreciation of 60s underground garage and psychedelic music. One important factor that unifies and likewise levels the playing field for all 27 tracks chosen was that they were all issued as singles. Every home should have this.



#### Various Artists : The DFA Remixes - Chapters One & Two

Tim Goldsworthy and James Murphy present these two remix compendiums (available separately) which collect

some of their favourite remixes that have helped establish them as one of the most innovative. indemand and revered production outfits in the world. Carefully cherry-picking their collaborations from the numerous offers has kept their integrity intact, meaning there's a distinct lack of polished turds on the tracklistings. Indeed, the DFA versions of Nine Inch Nails, Le Tigre, Radio 4 and Gorillaz arguably overshadow the originals, along with essential mixes of The Chemical Brothers, Metro Area, Tiga, Blues Explosion, Soulwax, Hot Chip, Goldfrapp and more.



#### Various Artists : Good God! - A Gospel Funk Hymnal A surefire selection of God's

messengers who crossed the border to blend their gospel with what surely

must be the devil's music: funk. A collection of this nature can only exist in hindsight: 'Gospel-funk' is a genre in the same way that deep soul or acid folk are. created by collectors and enthusiasts as a way to define a subsection of another genre. The Numero Group has spent the last year scouring sacred bargain bins and church sales for tracks that fit the bill: a mix of primitive choirs, spacious breaks, congas, elderly rappers impersonating the devil, cast recordings, thumping bass, and JB impressionists, all with a heavy slathering of gospel gravy.



### Various Artists : Rip It Up And Start Again (Post Punk 1978-1984)

Punk's raw power rejuvenated rock, but by the summer of 1977 the movement had become a parody of

itself. "Rip It Up And Start Again", the book and the CD. is a celebration of what happened next: post-punk bands like The Slits. Devo. Scritti Politti. Cabaret Voltaire, The Raincoats, and The Human League, who dedicated themselves to fulfilling punk's unfinished musical revolution. A veritable cornucopia of the great and the good from the late 70s/early 80s era, "Rip It Up" covers the post-punk spectrum from household names to esoteric cult artists.



#### Various Artists : Hugh Masekela Presents The CHISA Years 65-75 South African exile Hugh Masekela and Bronx dweller Stewart Levine met at the Manhattan School Of Music in

the early '60s. Sharing a mutual love of jazz, 60s pop, soul, rhythm & blues and the township jive 45s Masekela received from friends back home, the pair decided to set up their own label, CHISA, to record this fusion music they were hearing. Between '65 and '75 the label released a fair few tracks, from the huge hit of their debut release "Grazing In the Grass" by Masekela himself to Motown affiliated albums by voung singer Letta Mbulu and the more traditional sounding Zulus and Baranta. This compilation brings together hard to find rarities, and tracks that only got as far as the studio tape machine, until now.

#### Various Artists : CD86 indie

Back in 1986, as post-punk drifted into 'Indie-Pop', a new era of Sixties or punk obsessed bands cropped-up, all with an anti-mainstream, DIY ethic,

and a weird focus on childhood, as anoraks, dufflecoats and bowl haircuts took over and the C86 movement (standing for Cassette 1986, an NME freebie) was born. The feeling was of 'us and them': Them being the big, bad charts, and with a glut of seven-inch singles true, classic, unsullied pop was being wrestled back to us, the kids, the ones who KNEW! Phew, heady times! If this is new to you then have a dip, it's easily as good as all the indie sevens that fly out of our shop week in, week out.... some might say even better!!

#### Various Artists : Back To California - Ladies & Gentlemen Of The L.A. Canyons

The music made in the canyons of the Los Angeles basin, grew out of folk,

took a left turn into country, and culminated in the stadium-busting success of the Eagles and Linda Ronstadt. Exactly how this happened is the subject of the Barney Hoskyns book Hotel California, the story of a group of exceptional artists being elevated to superstar status by the guile and vision of managers and record executives. This compilation rounds up some of the less feted names in the Reprise/Asylum pantheon: misanthropic sideman/arranger Jack Nitzsche, country rock pioneer Gram Parsons, ex-Byrd Gene Clark, mystic songstress Judee Sill, acerbic intellectual Warren Zevon and Crazy Horse.



#### Various Artists : London Is The Place For Me III

After backing Britain's first black ballet company, Les Ballets Negres, in 1946, Ambrose Adekoya Campbell and

fellow Nigerian (via Manchester) musicians Ade Bashorun and Brewster Hughes, set themselves up as the West African Rhythm Brothers. They were joined by Harry Beckett, Harry Roachford and Adam Fiberesima. Around 1952 the group became residents at the Abalabi bar in Soho. Acclaimed by Fela Kuti himself, as the founder of modern Nigerian music, Campbell's recordings are collected on Volume 3 of this ace Honest Jon's series culled from the Melodisc 78s he cut in London over ten years from 1949.

Chris Bell : I Am The Cosmos Big Star guitarist Chris Bell was one of the unsung heroes of pop music; compiled posthumously after his death in 1978 "I Am The Cosmos" is both

uplifting and bleakly melancholic. Some songs are so desperate ("You And Your Sister" - covered by This Mortal Coil with Kim and Tanya from The Breeders and one of my favourite songs EVER) that it's easy to imagine he knew that the recognition he craved would come only after his death. A dark masterpiece.



Fern Jones : The Glory Road She sounded like Saturday night on a Sunday morning. Patsy on Jesus. Elvis without the pelvis. In the space of 20 years Fern Jones would perform

in over 2000 tents and churches for nearly 50,000 people. She released two albums ("The Joneses Sing" and "Singing A Happy Song") and a few impossibly rare 78s, and wrote one song that would be a classic on the gospel circuit for years to come ("I Was There When It Happened"). This CD, mostly culled from 1959's "Singing A Happy Song" features not one, not two, but four members of Nashville's prestigous Ateam fresh off June 1958 sessions with Elvis. Hank 'Sugarfoot' Garland on guitar (Roy Orbison, Hank Williams, Everly Brothers), Floyd Cramer played piano (Johnny Cash, Patsy Cline), Joe Zinkan on bass (Merle Haggard, Loretta Lynn), and the lovable Buddy Harman on drums (Willie Nelson). It's hollerin' rockabilly country and gospel sound is instantly catchy and you can see why she was such a hit on the preaching tent circuit. Essential!!!



Darondo : Let My People Go

Darondo's sublime "Didn't I" is without doubt one of the many highlights of Gilles Peterson's "Digs America" compilation. Well now Ubiquity's Luv

N' Haight label has dug a little deeper to find all six original single songs from the early 70s plus three newly enhanced demo tracks which have never before been released. As well as "Didn't I", there's the deluxe stringed soul "Let My People Go", the slick plaintive title track, mega-funk-sleaze on "Legs (Part 1)" and several more songs so unbelievable that you won't understand how they've stayed this secret for so long.

### Pavement : Wowee Zowee – Sordid Sentinels Edition

Pavement's classic drawn out angular and challenging third album, now gets the 'deluxe edition' reissue. Widely

regarded by critics and fans alike as their best album, this saw Pavement take on a darker and more introspective feel to their sound. A true indie classic that every home should own! Packaged as an embossed slipcase containing two CDs plus a 64page perfect-bound book. 50 tracks in total, including 18 unreleased recordings.



#### Antena : Camino Del Sol

In 1981, Isabelle Powaga, Pascale Moiroud and Sylvain Fasy decided to leave their sleepy hometown in the south of France for the City Of Lights.

Taking their love for the mechanical electronics of Kraftwerk, the Latin sounds and rhythms of Jobim & Gilberto and a few suitcases, they formed the band Antena. Signing with Belgium's Les Disques Du Crepescule (which formed an alliance with Factory, creating Factory Benelux), in 1982 they travelled to London to record their version of "The Boy From Ipanema" with ex-Ultravox electronic pioneer John Foxx for a 7" release, tagged 'electro-samba' by a pre-Pet Shop Boys Neil Tennent in Smash Hits.

Jay Dee's masterpiece inevitably retains poignancy due to the tragic circumstances of its release, yet the passion and talent shining through its mellifluous mix-tape soul transcends

any accusations of its popularity owing more to his death than his sonic accomplishment. My initial scepticism towards Dilla's audacious concept quickly diminished after a few close listens, as the album consummately took its place alongside 'Stakes Is High and 'Labcabincalifornia' as his career's defining work. On a personal level, the growing success of Weetabeat at Snook Bar in Fallowfield and the Guardian's foolish attention to such a phenomenon was a highlight, as was founding and popularising the 'new new rave' that is 'prep hop' within Piccadilly's mail order department. Timbaland rescued pop music (again), with Nelly and Justin vying for single of 2006 ('Promiscuous' snatched it) whilst Stones Throw ably resuscitated hip-hop from its prolonged moribundity with welcome tours, the afore-praised 'Donuts' and an excellent Madlib-produced Dudley Perkins LP. Live shows from Lyrics Born, TV On The Radio, De La, Midlake and Flaming Lips were great, as was the reflected glory I cheekily basked in whilst in Tuscany thanks to Italy's easy-to-love calcio champions - and the long overdue domestic rejuvenation of United.

2006 turned out to be an excellent year, with many highly promising new acts making an appearance, from those irreverent, exuberant and saucy electro-pop fledglings CSS, whose

album was a breath of fresh air after some of the pompous prog meandering I've been sent to sleep by over the last year, to the eerie, sepulchral folk of Bat For Lashes, and the wide horizons of Nathan Fake's warm, pastoral fentronica. It's the nature of charts I suppose that something has to come out on top, which is too bad, because Midlake's heartfelt collection of hymns for outsiders could very easily have shared the highly dubious accolade of being my favourite album of the year, almost arbitrarily being pipped to the post by Sol Seppy's passionate, vulnerable and lovingly formed debut. Reissue of the year - of ANY year - for me has to be the seductively presented Clash singles box, distilling as it does everything I love and value most about music, and instantly becoming my most precious musical artefact; gig of the year, by some distance, Regina Spektor's captivating performance at the Lowry; and disappointment of the year - also by some distance - not getting to see our Paul stood in the cold in his boxers outside Slaters at the grand opening of their new store. I would have paid. Not much mind, but I would have paid.

MBV-esque soundscapes. Ear punishers Sunn O))) and Boris joined forces for a surprising progressive experimental album. Glissandro 70 took accolades for their dub inflected avant-dance sounds. Function were another that took MBV's disorientating ethereal sways and moved it on another level. The Magik Markers released their 'first proper' album, and on the doom/ metal side of things, OM, Isis, and Red Sparowes and Boris all proved this to be a genre to watch. Elsewhere local's Day For Airstrikes did post-rock as well as anybody, Paul Duncan lovingly combined avant, electronica and laid back styles and Grabba Grabba Tape were plainly odd. Boredoms escapees OOIOO took up their customary position in the chart, Growing grew!, Isan moved into avant-tronica, Vincent Oliver (and other Loaf releases) took packaging to a new level, Enablers took this years "Spiderland" award and Peter Wright produced astonishing drone-scapes.

Carl Craig dominates any list of the best track of 2006, although he's barely produced an original note all year, save for the insanity of "Shez Satan". Remix-wise however, he's

rarely been anything but dead on target, with consecutive bombs for Rhythm & Sound, Theo Parrish, X-Press 2, Goldfrapp, Japanese Synchro System and the all-conquering Delia & Gavin mix, easily topping our list as the house and techno tune of the year. On a down note, August brought the sad news of the death of pioneering disco-house producer Adam Goldstone. The outside influences of disco, minimal and electroclash continue to define today's house sound, with a more electronic, technological sound developing across the spectrum, affecting such diverse artists as Germany's Jazzanova, New York's Quentin Harris and Kerri Chandler, Sweden's Raw Fusion roster Norway's Lindstrom and Prins Thomas and France's Ed Banger crew.

### electroclash/ punk-funk



From Gossip's Beth Ditto belting 'em out, via the lo-fi insanity of Bmore and baile funk, to the ear-bleeding synth distortion and guitar noise of Ed Banger releases and neu rave, 2006 (anthing got much LOUDER)

was the year everything got much LOUDER!

Kitsune Maison, Ed Banger, Modular and Gomma ruled the roost label-wise, while James Murphy and Tim Goldsworthy's DFA were kings of the remix yet again (watch out for the new LCD Soundsystem album early in 2007!!) - CSS caught the mood well with their brilliant "Let's Make Love And Listen To Death From Above", just the cutest disco-not-disco 45 of the year.

Lastly, for us oldies (and Brad too), there were reissues of post-punk classics by Talking Heads, ESG, Public Image Limited and Byrne & Eno, which, along with the companion compilation CD to Simon Reynolds' Rip It Up And Start Again book, had us wistfully thinking of our younger years.

How else do you explain such unclassifiable sounds as Brennan Green, Fram, Harvey's Map Of Africa, Force Of Nature, Sly Mongoose, Metalchicks, Studio and Manmade Science?

### downbeat/balearic/ electronica



Balearic beats made a return in 2006. It seemed like you couldn't move for house EPs that shifted their BPM downwards. Against this backdrop, the Quiet Village lot made a nuisance of

themselves with a series of name-making appearances following their Whatever We Want 12"s of 2005, subliminally paving the way for their 2007 album. We also enjoyed a series of low-key albums from A Mountain Of One, Studio and Beyond The Wizard's Sleeve, who were equally at home at this warmer, blissed-out altitude. Denmark's Music For Dreams returned and made the most of the crosspollination, as did Scandinavians Todd Terje, High Feelings and Mungolian Jet Set. The Beauty Room album on Peacefrog will forever remind us of some of the hottest days ever in the shop during the summer, soothing the painful memories of England's 'performance' during the World Cup in Germany.

Favourite labels included the new-to-us Numero Group, always ace Honest Jon's, reissue stalwarts Jazzman, Luv N' Haight and Trunk and torch bearers for soul / funk revivalists Freestyle, Daptone, MPM and Tru Thoughts. Not content with using his musical knowledge to compile more great collections ("Back In Brazil", "Sunday Afternoon At Dingwalls", "Pure Fire!" and "The Kings Of Jazz"), Gilles Peterson got in on the act too, setting up his own Brownswood Recordings imprint.

### latin/african/ world/reggae



2006 was another vintage year for global grooves, bringing us reggae from Toronto, Jamaica and London, jazz from Egypt, disco from Panama and Belize, Afro-beat and boogaloo

from New York and steel pan sounds from Trinidad. Soul Jazz continued to mine the vaults of Studio One, dropping second volumes of Soul, DJs and Scorcher, while introducing us to Rude Boy(s) and Groups, while those blends kept on flowing from Jstar, Upstate, Punchline and Noisy Bunch. Honest Jon's, Far Out, Ubiquity, Schema, Especial, Basic Replay, Soundway and Wackies all delivered much-played collections and reissues. Lastly, Lily Allen's "Smile" helped us grin and bear it through the usual yearly shop heatwave, the big crossover reggae-pop hit of the summer!

The year in rap was overshadowed by the untimely death of James Yancey (aka Jay Dee / J Dilla), who succumbed to the blood disease he had suffered with on 10<sup>th</sup> February.

With terrible coincidence, this happed to be the very same week which his magnificent solo album "Donuts" was released around the world by Stones Throw, highlighting what a loss would be missed.

The global success of Gnarls Barkley reinforced how much talent the Dangerdoom and Gorillaz producer Danger Mouse had to spare, while The Roots proved once more that they are the most consistent group in hip hop today. The absence of any new material Kanye West (apart from guesting on "Number One" by fellow egomaniac Pharrell) left the door open for upand-comers like Lupe Fiasco and Aloe Blacc, while old Bay Area pals Cut Chemist and DJ Shadow went head-to-head with their new solo albums.
